

## Public Transit in Halifax



Welcome to Halifax! As the largest city in Atlantic Canada, Halifax is also the political, commercial, financial, and cultural center of Nova Scotia, and its public transit is very convenient. You can get real-time information from Google Transit or Bing Maps.

#### **Bus Services**

Halifax's downtown area is not significant. Living in the city you can rely on buses. Most lines begin operation from 6:00 am to 12:00 pm. The services will be reduced on weekends and holidays, and extreme weather will change the schedule. Express Routes usually operated only on weekdays with fewer stops at peak hours to help people commute to work.

Buses are crewless ticketing buses, you need to bring your change, and drivers do not change. You can purchase paper tickets at Shoppers Drug Mart, Lawton's Drug Mart, etc. If you want to transfer, you need to ask the driver for a transfer ticket when you board the bus or ferry, and the ticket marks the valid time (up to one and a half hours after the last time point on the route) for a free transfer at the bottom. Keep your eyes on the road or stop announcements when taking the bus. The driver will not stop if there is no pull line or button to stop and no one is waiting at the bus stop.

Free for children under 12, discount for youth 13-17 and seniors over 65. People over 65 can travel free during off-peak hours on Tuesdays (10:00 am to 3:30 pm and after 6:00 pm). A university student can use a U-pass to get an annual discounted transit pass during the school year.

## **Regional Express Routes**

There are three Regional Express routes, named 320, 330, and 370 lines, which connect three surrounding areas of Halifax (the Airport, Tantallon, and Porters Lake, respectively) to Scotia Square downtown. Only route 320 (serving the Airport) provides service on the weekend.

#### Access-A-Bus

The entire Halifax Transit fleet is accessible, and senior and disabled persons may use the Access-A-Bus service. Access-A-Bus is a shared, door-to-door transit service for people unable to use the conventional transit system due to mobility impairment or cognitive disability. Any individual who qualifies for the service must apply to use the Access-A-Bus before becoming a passenger.

### **Ferry Service**

Downtown Halifax is conveniently connected to Dartmouth by ferry, which takes only a dozen minutes to reach the other side. Two ferry routes are accessible and integrated with the bus services. The ferry starts service at 6:30 am and ends at 11:30 pm. During the weekday rush hour, there is a ferry every 15 minutes. There will also be ferries on weekends and holidays, but Halifax Transit will reduce the number of ferries. Note that there will be no ferries on Christmas Day, New Year's Day, and Good Friday.

# Nova Scotia Bur Home



Alexander Graham Bell (1847.3.3-1922.8.2), a Scottish-born American inventor, scientist, and educator of the deaf, is known as the inventor of the telephone and the founder of the Bell Telephone Company (a predecessor of AT&T). Bell immigrated to Canada when he was 23 years old before

moving to the USA. He spent his later years working and living in Baddeck, a village in the middle of Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia. Bell's home where he lived and worked is now a national historic site, which displays the inventor's mementos, photos, and models. If you are touring Cape Breton Island, this museum is worth a visit.
