How Volunteers Can Help

As an English Language Learning (ELL) Volunteer you will provide newcomers with:

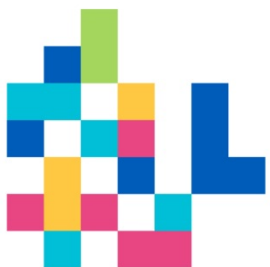
- Improved ability to communicate in English
- Improved knowledge of HRM, Nova Scotia and Canada
- Improved access to community resources
- Improved access to networks of English-speaking communities
- Increased engagement and sense of belonging in the community

The Volunteer Role

- Establish learners' goals and discuss options with your program coordinator
- Talk informally with learners and note particular areas where help is needed, and encouraging learners to identify specific goals
- Meet weekly with an assigned learner or small learning group at an arranged time and location in a library branch
- Prepare suitable activities and/or topics for discussion using appropriate resources for practice
- Plan session time to provide structure and enjoyment for learners.
- Encourage and support learners during sessions, providing assistance when required
- Research appropriate learning and tutoring resources for your learner, using library materials and other resources as appropriate
- Meet with ELL program coordinators to discuss learning difficulties and successes
- Participate in useful tutor training opportunities where possible
- Demonstrate clear and competent communication skills and good learning habits.
- Share ideas and resources with other tutors in the program
- Participate in additional social and learning activities, when possible

We are looking for volunteers who:

- Are at least 18 years of age



- Have completed high school or a high school equivalent
- Engage well with others and are skilled at providing personalized help
- Are passionate about welcoming newcomers into your community and are knowledgeable about local culture and life
- Have a good understanding of the challenges and barriers newcomers face in their settlement process
- Have a passion for working with community members and seek opportunities to build relationships
- Communicate effectively and can adapt to changing needs and priorities
- Are friendly, outgoing and enjoy meeting new people from around the globe and learning about culture
- Are objective, impartial and non-judgmental in your work.
- Understand that it is important to recognize that you are working with individuals from many backgrounds with varying needs
- Are patient and supportive

Time commitment:

2 hours per week tutoring time and 1 hour session preparation time per week.
A minimum 3 month commitment to the program is also required.

Note:

All volunteers will require a Criminal Records Check. The library will initiate these through MyBackCheck.com and will also cover the cost.
